Herbert J. Brinks is Curator of the Archives of Heritage Hall at Calvin College, is editor of Origins magazine and served on the history faculty at Calvin. He has authored and edited numerous books among them Write Back Soon: Letters From Immigrants in North America 1847-1920, and articles in Peter White and Michigan Reader.

Elton J. Bruins is the Blekkink Professor of Religion at Hope College. He has served as Dean of Humanities and Chairman of the Religion Department. In addition to numerous articles on Dutch-American studies, Bruins is the author of *The Americanization of a Congregation* and *Isaac Cappon: Holland's Foremost Citizen*.

Herman Ganzevoort is associate professor of History at the University of Calgary. His interest in the sociology of religion has resulted in numerous articles in the Michigan Sociological Review, Journal of Biosocial Science and The Church Herald among others.

Yda Schreuder is Associate Professor in Geography at the University of Delaware. INTRODUCTION

The Dutch and Their Faith: Immigrant Religious Experience in the 19th and 20th Centuries was the 8th biennial conference of the Association for the Advancement of Dutch American Studies (AADAS). The conference was hosted by the Joint Archives of Holland on the campus of Hope College.

Our attempt was to bring together scholars and informed laypeople to discuss the wide variety of religious traditions and experiences among the Dutch. Although nearly every previous AADAS conference has touched upon the religious dimension, especially those in the Reformed vein, we had not attempted to isolate it as an important component of the ethnic life of Dutch immigrants.

As is true for nearly every immigrant group that ventured to American shores, religion played a central role for the Dutch. This can be seen in all the papers presented. For example the paper of Donald Luidens and Roger Nemeth, indicating that faith still plays a significant role among the descendants of Dutch. Some of these arrived well over a century ago, others who arrived in the wake of World War II's devastation and some among the trickle still arriving in the United States.

It was a pleasure to host both the presenters and the nearly 100 people who attended the conference. A fascinating presentation was given by our keynote, author Ronald Jager. You will find his comments on the following pages and they are sure to bring a smile. Other discussions contained here will wrinkle your brow or possibly provide a grimace that among the Dutch there could not be more harmony. Finally you may be pleasantly surprised at the depth of commitment and genuine affinity this ethnic group has had among themselves.

This compilation reaches beyond the Dutch Reformed which is the background of many AADAS members. Our intention was to incorporate as many different experiences as possible including Reformed, Catholic and Jewish traditions. I believe that we have accomplished this goal.
